

 - Plantation Capitalism





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
Problems & Definitions

- Problem of Defining Nonviolence
 - Depends on what "violence" is
 - Un-Violence, Violence-less-ness or Violence-free-action
 - Nonviolent coercion/force...?
 - Non-killing
- Pacifism and its varieties
 - Absolute vs. Conditional
 - Consequentialist vs. Deontological
 - Intuitive Pacifism = Peace as a fundamental value
- Varieties of Nonviolence
 - Non-Resistance
 - Non-Cooperation
 - Active Nonviolent Resistance



Nonviolence as Root or Flower?


- Negative Nonviolence
 - Emerges/develops out of prior violence (negation of violence)
 - A flower that develops out of (against) background of violence
- Positive Nonviolence
 - The root or background condition of genuine, life-affirming, and constructive power
 - An affirmative worldview



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
Comprehensive Nonviolence

- Nonviolence is Bigger than Violence
 - Nonviolence is loving.
 - Nonviolence is truthful.
 - Nonviolence is just.
- Expanding Circle of Concern
 - Nonviolence toward friends/neighbors
 - Nonviolence toward universal humanity
 - Nonviolence toward all sentient beings



Problems in Defining Violence/Nonviolence

- Varieties of Violence
 - Direct vs. Indirect
 - Spectacular vs. Atmospheric
 - Structural/Institutional Violence
 - Cultural Violence
 - Factors: Vehemence, Harm, Consent
- Nonviolence as the negation/opposite of these
 - What would count as <u>Direct/Spectacular Nonviolence</u>?
 - Is there <u>Structural Nonviolence</u>?
 - What would a **Culture of Nonviolence** look like?




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Ordinary Nonviolence vs. Heroic Nonviolence


- Heroic nonviolence
 - Gandhi and King

- Ordinary nonviolence:
 - "Constructive Program" of ordinary life
 - Nonviolence for everyone?






Minimizing Violence and Seeking Alternatives

- Preventative Nonviolence
 - Education
 - Democratic Institutions
 - Social Solidarity
- Nonviolent Defense
 - Organized mass nonviolent resistance
 - Non-Cooperation and Disobedience




Careful that this is not patronizing to the marginalized



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Moral and Political Jiu-Jitsu

- Richard Gregg (1885-1974): Moral
 - Surprising and Creative responses to aggression and violence
 - Includes Voluntary Suffering
 - Ex.: "Turning the other cheek"
- Gene Sharp (1928-2018): Political Jiu-Jitsu
 - To become ungovernable
 - Mobilizing Solidarity
 - Ex. Images of oppression strengthen the resistance



Principled vs. Pragmatic Nonviolence

Principled Nonviolence


- Pacifism as a Worldview
- Nonviolence because it is GOOD

Pragmatic Nonviolence

- Strategic Use of Nonviolence
- Nonviolence because it WORKS

Democracy and Nonviolence

- Is Democracy GOOD or EFFECTIVE?
- Nonviolence of ordinary democracy (voting, etc.) = defuses social tensions
- Democratic Peace Theory: Democracies don't fight each other
- BUT ALSO: human rights as ends in themselves

Symbolic protest and persuasion

- Letter writing
- Public Speaking
- Graffiti?
- · Ex. Banksy

Non-cooperation

- · Work slow-downs
- · Strike: Local and General
- Boycotts: Economic and Political
- Ex. Montgomery Bus Boycott

Intervention

- Civil Disobedience
- · Sabotage and Monkey-Wrenching
